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














# From the President:

### Dr. Margaret M. McMenamin is Officially Invested as Union County College's 8th President

After a week of rain, the sun came out and shone brightly on Union County College for the April 14, 2011 Presidential Investiture of Dr. Margaret M. McMenamin as the eighth president and first female in the College's 78-year history. Invited guests joined in the historic celebration including members of Dr. McMenamin's family, delegates from other colleges and universities, the College's Boards of Trustees and Governors as well as faculty, staff and students.

Dr. McMenamin was sworn into office by Union County Judge James Hely. The theme of her Investiture was "Caring, Courage, Community." Her address centered around this theme. She believes that a successful institution can only occur when all members of the College's faculty and staff care about one another, about their careers, and their mission – to serve Union County College students. Members of the community must have the courage to change and to try new things. It is important that the College community works together to prepare students to enter into both the local and global community. The College community should be a place of support, personal growth and encouragement where students and employees can excel together.

- Implementation of ERP. The College completed the first phase of a multi-phase implementation plan with the March 22, 2011, "Go Live." This began the successful transition from an outdated database system to the Colleague system for employee and student records, both credit and noncredit registration, and other business systems. In support of the new Colleague system, the College installed a new network, server, and data back-up infrastructure at all Campuses. Other technology highlights included the introduction of a new Web site, a Web portal to provide single-log-on system access for students and employees, and new computer labs on the Plainfield and Cranford campuses.
- "Operation Graduation" increased the number of graduates in 2011 from 875 to 1,065.
- Day 1 and 2 As students returned for Spring and Fall semesters, they were welcomed back to campus by employees wearing bright red "Ask Me" buttons, encouraging "intrusive intervention."
   Staff were stationed at major points of entry with class schedules and information to help students find their classes with a minimum of confusion.
- New Smoking Policy On May 23, 2011, the College began enforcing a new smoking policy. Four smoking areas were designated on the Cranford Campuss, as well as two smoking areas on the Elizabeth campus, and one on the Plainfield campus.
- New emergency telephone system installed on all three campuses. Students, staff, and community members will find these yellow emergency boxes in every corridor providing immediate access, 24/7, to the College's security force.



- The Paralegal Studies Program, which offers an Associate in Applied Science degree and a certificate program, was granted approval by the American Bar Association (ABA) at its mid-year meeting in February 2011.
- The college created two new certificate programs for Emergency Medical Studies. The EMS certificate program requires 31 credits and serves as a step toward the degree. The other new certificate is a 13-credit certificate of achievement for EMS, which serves as an intermediate stop toward the Emergency Medical Studies Certificate.
- The College secured almost \$6 million in grants in 2010-11, including U.S. Department of Labor Project ABLE funds totaling \$1.26 million, U.S. Department of Education Title V Cooperative funds of \$3.34 million, U.S. Department of Education Perkins funds totaling \$707,035, AmeriCorp funds totaling \$135,361, federal Appropriations (Green Workforce) funds totaling \$400,000; and a U.S. Dept. of Health & Human Services-Health Professions Opportunity Grant of \$2.1 million.
- Thomas H. Brown Center for Business & Educational Advancement Through the Director of Events and Conferencing, Union County College began regularly renting conference space in the Thomas H. Brown Center for Business & Educational Advancement in the Elizabeth I. Kellogg Building generating more than \$10,000 in net revenue during the last quarter of FY 2011.
- Chief Academic Officer and Provost of the Plainfield Campus The College filled two key positions during 2011. Dr. Maris Lown was named Chief Academic Officer/Vice President of Academic Affairs. Dr. Negar Farakish was named the Provost/Assistant Vice President for the Plainfield Campus.
- To bolster the Alumni Association as well as student services, the College created a College Lidivision under a dean and manager who are responsible for creating stronger linkages between alumni and current students.

## Union County College's Return on Investment

### Center for Economic & Workforce Development

(CEWD) serves up to 4,000 students each year with educational programs including English as a Second Language, ESL CIVICS, Basic Skills Development and GED preparation. CEWD staff tests more than 6,000 per year to place individuals in the appropriate educational program and level of instruction. In addition, CEWD is the only GED Testing Center in Union County, providing testing services to over 800 people per year.



### **Certificate of Appreciation**

Joan Rodney of the Center for Economic & Workforce Development received a certificate of appreciation from the NJ State Department of Education. Ms. Rodney manages the Center, which provides high-school equivalency (GED) services to more than 800 people annually who need their high school diploma.

### A State Leader in Noncredit Education

Union County College enrolled 10,983 people in personal and professional development courses in 2011, ranking Union County College at the top in New Jersey. The 2011 student body at Union County College originates from different countries and the United States of America.

### 2011 Financial Aid Facts

In 2011, the Financial Aid Office processed more than16,000 financial aid applicants and over 8100 students were awarded over \$37,000,000.

Among federal aid programs, 6,599 students received a Federal Pell Grant, 1,025 students received Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, 1,657 received a Subsidized Stafford Loan, 1,269 received an Unsubsidized Stafford Loan, and 8 students received funds through a PLUS loan.

With regard to state financial aid programs, 2,357 students received a Tuition Aid Grant (TAG), 255 received funds from the Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF), 84 students received funds from NJ STARS, 9 students received Distinguished Scholars funding, 17 received Urban Scholars funding, and 16 borrowed a NJ CLASS Loan.

In addition, 637 students received scholarships from the Union County College Foundation.

### Paralegal Program Receives ABA Approval

The American Bar Association (ABA) declared the college's Paralegal program to be outstanding in its field. As a result, the program was granted approval by the ABA at its mid-year meeting in February.

### **Door to Humanities**

A ribbon cutting ceremony in the MacKay Library celebrated the opening of the doorway between the libraryand the humanities building. Dr. McMenamin cut the ribbon and Dr. Rubin of the English Department was the first to cross the threshold of that door in several years.


### **New College-Wide Smoking Policy**





### Commencement 2011 Graduated Largest Class Ever

There was pomp and circumstance as more than 600 students crossed the stage at this year's ceremony, the largest group ever to participate. Dr. McMenamin led her first ceremony, which lasted almost  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours as the students shook her hand and received their degrees. In total, the class of 2011 had 1,065 graduates. Dr. McMenamin's "Operation Graduation" campaign, which had begun during the spring semester, was effective, having moved students who were eligible for graduation, to complete the task.



He maintains a nursery on the College's Cranford campus and in the past 16 years he has established The Historic Tree Grove on the campus.

The Historic Tree Grove is a dendrology of 95 oaks, maples, locusts, willows, sycamores, and more. They come from the homes of presidents and other historic figures such as George Washington, FDR, the Wright Brothers, and Martin Luther King. The seeds were also gathered from Civil War battlefields and the homes of American war heroes. The trees in the grove are the direct offspring of the trees owned by those people, raised from seed to sapling by Dr. Ombrello at the College.

Some trees are historic because they have been around so long. Others are from a historic spot, such as the Gettysburg Address Honey Locust taken from a hilltop a hundred yards from the spot where Lincoln delivered his Gettysburg address.


Dr. Ombrello collects most of the seeds himself on trips he takes to the various historic sites and in the process, fulfills his personal interest in history. To maintain the seeds, he refrigerates them at about 40 degrees until they are mature enough to plant. The seeds are then planted in the newly renovated greenhouse on the College's Cranford campus until they are strong enough to transfer to the nursery. After a few years there, they are planted in the historic tree grove. The nursery is made of wire fence and gates to protect the history of the trees from the deer, rabbits, and squirrels.

Dr. Ombrello's dedication to his craft has influenced students in many ways. In late 2011, Dr. Ombrello received a noteworthy tribute from a former student. Theodosia Tamborlane, '08, took a horticulture course with Dr. Ombrello while she was pursuing her degree in fine arts. Inspired by him and his work, she painted "Ombrello's World." In December 2011, Tamborlane donated "Ombrello's World" to the College in the professor's honor. The painting now hangs permanently in the Science Building on the Cranford campus as a testament to Dr. Ombrello's commitment to his students and Union County College.



### Alejos is "Woman of the Year"



The performances were made possible thanks to the efforts of Professor Paul Tse, who teaches music at the College. Both events were made possible by funding provided by the Student Government Association








### Student Art in the Tomasulo Gallery

More than 50 Continuing Education instructors participated in an Open House on Saturday, Sept. 10, 2011, at the COUNTY Cranford Campus. Instructors greeted prospective

students, answered questions and helped boost enrollment in a vast noncredit course portfolio ranging from personal-enrichment classes, such as in art, dance, music, and sports, to more than 35 career-preparation certification programs. This fall, Continuing Education introduced new certificates in Appliance Technician, Automotive Electronic Technician, Electronics Technician, Medical Assisting, and Wedding Planner. Besides offering these classes in Cranford, for the first time ever the department is

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The Retail Skills Center at the Jersey Gardens Mall is managed by Union County College. It is a valuable resource for the residents of the City of Elizabeth with its training and job placement services. It serves our residents and employers in the greater Elizabeth area by instilling in the residents a sense of job responsibility, knowledge of employer expectations and skills important for success in meeting the challenges of the retail industry.

- In 2011, the center placed 425 city residents in positions with 118 different companies. Over the past three years, 1022 residents were prepared and placed through training classes, job counseling and job fairs.
- In this same year, the center trained 220 residents in Customer Service and Sales related programs which equates to 18,233 training hours and a total of 21,564 hours for all services.
- 1374 residents took advantage of job counseling services at the Center.
- The benefits of the Retail Skills Center were also felt by employers at Jersey Gardens Mall who took advantage of 14 job fairs managed by the center. New stores that opened this year were Aerie by American Eagle, Andrew Marc and the new Disney Store that opened today, January 11, 2012.
- Beyond the Mall, Revolution Foods, based in Oakland, California opened an operations center in Elizabeth in August after the center worked with them on their hiring requirements

The job fair coordinated by the center helped them hire 26 employees, 20 from the City of Elizabeth.

- In October the Center held a job fair for the holiday hiring season. Fourteen stores participated: Marshalls, Brooks Brothers, Calvin Klein, Osh Kosh, Converse to name a few. This job fair produced 58 positions for residents from the 14 stores.
- A total of 4112 residents were served in 2011 for training, job fairs, job counseling and outreach events in the City of Elizabeth.



In April 2011, the Retail Skills Center helped place students in the United Airlines Summer Assist Agents Program. With help from the Office of College Relations with publicity, the Center had 125 students attend the three information sessions and 55 students went on to "interview" with United Airlines. Of those who interviewed, 46 were from the City of Elizabeth (84%), 37 were Union County College students (76%), 11 students were attending other colleges but were Elizabeth residents, and seven were high school students. United Airlines intended to select 15-20 students from the Union group to place in the total number of 60 needed Summer Agents.

The Retail Skills Center is a model for workforce development in the State of New Jersey, effectively implementing a public/private collaborative effort to address the workforce needs of the City of Elizabeth.

### Freeholders Support Summer Youth Programs

Last year's County-sponsored program to steer local youth toward careers drew praise from hundreds of students and parents. As a result, the Freeholders have directed the County Workforce Investment Board (WIB) to extend the program throughout the year and offer it to almost 150 of the County's high-school age residents. Union County College and several community-based organizations are devel oping a Career Prep Academy for out-ofschool and in-school youth and College Prep 101 for high school seniors. Both programs are designed to help economically disadvantaged youth.

### Elizabeth Campus

The Elizabeth Campus is comprised of the Sidney F. Lessner Building and the Elizabeth I Kellogg Building on West Jersey Street. The campus provides classrooms, a theater, lecture halls, seminar and conference rooms, allied health, computer and science laboratories, the Kellogg Library, the Academic Learning Center, faculty and administrative offices, faculty and student lounges, a cafeteria, a bookstore and the Thomas H. Brown Center for Business & Educational Advancement. Trinitas School of Nursing is also located on Union County College's Elizabeth Campus in the Andrea and Victor M. Richel Family Foundation Center for Education and Nursing.



### Plainfield Campus

The Plainfield Campus is comprised of most of a city block between East Second and East Third Streets and Church Street and Roosevelt Avenue. The three story building contains classrooms, a lecture hall, allied health, computing and science laboratories, seminar and conference rooms, a Library and Academic Learning Center and faculty and administrative offices. The adjacent building on the site, "The Annex" suffered serious damage from the fire in September. It housed instructional space for Emergency Medical Technician/Paramedic training and a state-of-the-art laboratory for American Sign Language and Deaf Studies. Both these programs have temporarily relocated to the Elizabeth Campus. In addition, "The Annex" housed a student lounge, faculty offices, a faculty lounge, bookstore and cafeteria.





A scholarship provides the precious opportunity of higher education. As enrollments continue to increase, so too does the need for scholarships. Union County College's dedicated alumni and friends provide invaluable financial assistance to make a college education possible for hundreds of students each year.

Through the continued generosity of our donors, the Union County College Foundation provided \$571,325 in annual and endowed scholarships. An additional \$71,741 was awarded to 50 students through the Union County Freeholders Scholarships for Union County residents with a grade point average of 3.0 and above, who are graduates of County schools and whose family meets established criteria. Another 84 students received \$210,348 in NJ STARS scholarships, a merit-based program funded by the State of New Jersey to recognize students who ranked in the top 15 percent of their graduating class.


aerospace engineering. Ibty and Marq were married September 13, 2011. They were both known for their great respect and love of people.

Although the College's financial position is currently sound, the economic position of the College is closely tied to that of the State of New Jersey and the County of Union New Jersey because the College is dependent upon State and County Appropriations to offset the Operating Loss it incurs from the excess of the cost of education over the revenues it receives from tuition, fees and tuition assistance grants, contracts and gifts. These appropriations and Federal, State and local grants and contracts are influenced by the national, State and local economic climate.

Looking forward begins with student enrollment

growth which is dependent on an array of factors including population growth rate, unemployment rate, and the number of high school graduates in Union County and the surrounding areas. During FY 2011 student enrollment increased 2.7%, and the Fall 2011 enrollment has increased approximately 0.9% over the preceding Fall semester. Further, the College Tuition and Fee credit hour rates for FY 2012 will increase \$11.75 (9.0%).


Although management continues to place great emphasis on cost containment to mitigate rising costs and to minimize tuition increases, major operating expenses have increased this past year and are expected to increase in the future. Salaries and benefits account for approximately 70% of the College's operating expenses. Bargaining agreements, both existing and in process of negotiation, will likely dictate salary increases approximating \$1.3 million dollars (3.2%), annually through June 30, 2012.



Alert module will allow faculty and staff a systemic approach to identifying "at risk" students in an effort to increase retention and graduation goals.

The College continues to maintain most of its liquid assets in cash. At fiscal year-end the cash position of the College is seasonally high to prepare for payment of continued operating expenses during the months before the next significant influx of tuition and grant monies. Interest rates on the cash position have decreased significantly and we do not expect a turnaround during FY 2012.

Additional capital projects planned in FY 2012 include extensive renewal and replacement of HVAC units in the Science building of the College and various interior renovations at the Lessner Building in Elizabeth. In addition, the College is planning a 32,600 square foot raised construction building with parking underneath on the Cranford campus. This expansion will allow for future growth and ongoing capacity issues for Student Services. This would be a 2012 "Chapter 12" project costing approximately \$9.9 million. If future "Chapter 12" funds become available, an interior renovation of the Lessner Building would take place to reconfigure registration and counseling areas.

### With ongoing cost considerations

under constant scrutiny and continued support from the State and County of Union, the College expects that it will be able to continue to provide an affordable, high quality education to its students. With the plan for enhanced facilities coupled with a means to provide students communication and self-service tools that the new ERP system offers, the College will continue to assure that the quality and extent of services provided to students will meet their needs and expectations.
