The College has been providing excellent and affordable educational opportunities to Union County residents for almost 90 years, transforming our community, one student at a time.

90 Years of History

- 1933: Union County Junior
 College opens on October
 16 as an "emergency junior
 college" with evening
 classes at Abraham Clark
 High School in Roselle.
- **1934:** Dr. Hubert Banks Huntley becomes the first chief administrator of Union County Junior College.
- 1935: Dr. Charles G. Cole succeeds Dean Huntley and is considered the first "President."
- 1936: Union County Junior
 College is established as a
 non-profit institution
 governed by a Board of
 Trustees.
- **1936:** The College changes its name to Union Junior College (UJC).
- 1940: Basketball is the only varsity sport at UCNJ. The '39/'40 girl's basketball squad captures first place in the "Powderpuff League." This is the first championship for a UJC Team.
- 1941: The College begins offering day courses on Sept. 1 and continues to use the laboratories at Abraham Clark High School.
- 1942: UJC is housed at Grant School, called the "Old Lady of Holly Street," and rents the space from the Cranford Board of Education.
- 1944: To better accommodate returning veterans from WWII, the College creates a Veterans Study Center and changes the academic year from two semesters to one divided into four quarters.

- **1944:** Dr. Kenneth Campbell

 MacKay succeeds Dr. Cole
 as president.
- 1948: For less than \$56,000, the Board of Trustees authorizes the purchase of 56 acres from the Dreyer family in Cranford. A decade later it becomes the home of the Cranford Campus.
- 1949: Elizabeth General Hospital begins its affiliation with the College in the training of nurses. Later, Muhlenberg Hospital joins the partnership. Elizabeth General is now Trinitas School of Nursing and Muhlenberg Hospital Nursing School is now JFK Medical Center Muhlenberg Harold B. and Dorothy A. Snyder Schools. Both still operate cooperative programs with the College.

- **1970:** The College begins holding classes in Elizabeth at the Bayway Community Center and the Elizabeth YMCA on Aug. 5.
- **1970:** The College begins offering classes in Plainfield on Sept. 2.
- **1973:** The MacKay Library opens on the Cranford Campus.
- **1974:** Dr. Saul Orkin becomes president and serves until his death in 1983.
- **1982:** Union College merges with the Union County
 Technical Institute and
 Union County College is established on Aug. 17.
- **1983:** Dr. Derek N. Nunney is named president.
- **1990:** Dr. Thomas H. Brown becomes president.
- **1991:** The Campus Center, now known as the Victor M. Richel Student Commons, opens on the Cranford Campus.
- **1992:** The College purchases the Courier News Building in Plainfield and begins offering courses in the newly renovated two-story building.

- **1992:** The Elizabeth Campus opens on Sept. 1. The former Elizabethtown Gas Company building is named the Sidney F. Lessner Building.
- **1995:** "The Pavilion" opens at the Cranford Campus with a new Fitness Center and the Executive Education Center.
- 1999: The Annex Building is completed in Plainfield and houses instructional space for the American Sign Language and the Emergency Medical Technician/ Paramedic programs.
- **2002:** Trinitas School of Nursing moves to the Elizabeth Campus.
- 2009: Thanks to the support of the Union County Board of County Commissioners, the College opens the \$48 million Elizabeth I. Kellogg Building at 40 West Jersey Street in Elizabeth on Sept. 29.
- **2010:** Dr. Margaret M. McMenamin, the College's eighth and first female president, begins her tenure on July 1.



UCNJ has been named a finalist for the Aspen Prize for Community **College Excellence.**

This award is given out every two years, and the College was chosen from more than 1,000 community colleges across the country as one of 10 finalists for the 2025 Aspen Prize. UCNJ was recognized for having high levels of student success, equitable outcomes for Black and Hispanic students, as well as for students from lower-income backgrounds. UCNJ is the only finalist from New Jersey. The College was first recognized for the 2021 Aspen Prize, being named one of the Top 150 Community Colleges in the country. This was then followed by being named as one of 25 semifinalists for the 2023 Aspen Prize.

On October 16, 1933, 243 students began taking evening courses at Union County Junior College. Founded as an "emergency junior college" through the federal Works Project Administration, the goal was to provide jobs for unemployed teachers and professors. Ninety years, four campuses, and thousands of graduates later, the College celebrated its 90th Founders Day with a prohibition-era theme to mark that time. Students, faculty, staff, board members, and alumni gathered outside of the Victor M. Richel Commons to dedicate a new gazebo in honor of the 90th and enjoy prohibition inspired food and beverages as well as a DJ and photobooth. Here's to the next 90, UCNJ! Together, the College will continue to transform our community, one student at a time.

Addressing Food Insecurity is Top Priority at UCNJ

The Union County Board of County Commissioners, under the leadership of Chairwoman Kimberly Palmieri-Mouded, have generously provided \$250,000 in support of the College's food insecurity programs.

This is in addition to the critical operating and capital aid they provide to UCNJ. The Office of Social Work Services opened the renovated food pantry named Hoot's Market. The space allows for supermarket style shelving with an electronic checkout system. The College is increasing the ways for students to receive food, including grubpasses, which allow a student to get a free meal while on campus, and hosting farmers markets with fresh vegetables and fruits. After attending the Hoot's Market ribbon cutting, Union County Commissioner Sergio Granados pledged a donation on behalf of Moving New Jersey Forward, which is a community-based non-profit he founded. The College continues with the goal of having no student go hungry.

UCNJ boasts a warm and friendly environment, with the Open House welcoming recently graduating high school seniors, non-traditional students, and transfer students.

Top UCNJ Students Transfer to Elite Institutions

Each year, UCNJ graduates transfer to some of the most selective institutions in the country.

This year, Precious Opaola will be continuing her education at Princeton University.

Precious Opaola, of Linden, is a UCNJ Class of 2024 graduate who received her Associate Degree in social services. After attending Princeton University's inaugural summer transfer scholar program in 2023, Precious applied and was accepted into Princeton University for the Fall 2024 semester. While at UCNJ, she served as the Vice President of Service and Fundraising for Phi Theta Kappa honor society, a tutor for the Academic Learning Center, a member of American Honors, a member of the National Society of Leadership and Success, and a Kaplan Scholar. For her career, Precious wants to own a non-profit organization that focuses on helping lower-income children take advantage of the opportunities around them.



In a groundbreaking initiative, the Union County College Foundation has launched the Margolies Family Transfer Scholarship, a pioneering program aimed at facilitating the dreams of students aspiring to transfer to selective colleges.

This scholarship, the first of its kind at UCNJ, offers up to \$25,000 in transfer funds over two years, providing a unique opportunity for students to embark on a transformative academic journey.

Funded by the by the Margolies family, this scholarship aims to alleviate the financial barriers that often hinder such aspirations, enabling students to pursue their educational goals without the burden of excessive financial strain.

The two students selected this year are Myrvens Sylvestre, a computer science major from Roselle. He will be transferring to Claremont McKenna College in California, one of the top liberal arts college in the country. Nicole Resende Lucena, an engineering major from Union Township will be transferring to Stevens Institute of Technology in New Jersey.





To conclude the ceremonies, graduates were all smiles as President McMenamintook a selfie.




Congratulations Class of 2024!

Welcoming the Center for Adult Transitions

At UCNJ, all students are encouraged to enroll and given the guidance to succeed.

Funded by a grant by Governor Murphy, the Center for Adult Transitions was born. The Center allows students up to age 24 who have developmental disabilities, intellectual disabilities, ADD, ADHD, neurodiversity, and learning difficulties to receive support in their coursework at UCNJ.

The NEST hosts several workshops for students, including career workshops, learning relaxation techniques, learning basic computer functions and Microsoft Office, and financial aid.






ACADEMIC LEARNING CENTER

ALC Accelerates Student Success

For nearly 40 years, the Academic Learning Center has provided UCNJ students with free peer to peer tutoring. The ALC typically has almost 70 tutors across the Cranford, Elizabeth, and Plainfield Campuses. ALC tutors have reached high academic success in their given tutoring field and provide support to students. When students visit the ALC, they are provided guidance, a better understanding of their coursework, and develop a mentor relationship with the peer tutor.







A Variety of Honor Societies

Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) is the largest honor society at UCNJ.

PTK promotes scholarship, development of character, and leadership. To become a member, a student must complete at least 12 credits, maintain a 3.5 GPA or higher, and participate in volunteer activities throughout the semester. This spring, PTK held the new member ceremony with 232 inductees. For decades, the Iota Xi chapter at UCNJ has maintained its reputation of being a Five Star Chapter amongst all the chapters in the Middle States Region.

At their annual Middle States Region Convention, the Iota Xi chapter was honored with several awards. Also, Senior Professor in Mathematics and newly appointed PTK advisor Dr. Anna Brophy received the Paragon Award for New Advisors for her hard work in the chapter.

The Omicron Beta chapter of Tau Alpha Pi National Honor Society is a national honor society for students in the engineering and engineering technology programs at UCNJ.



Research Days at UCNJ

Union Honors is a program at UCNJ for high achieving, academically motivated students looking to transfer to a four-year institution. Each year, the Honors program hosts a Research Day for their students to present their findings to the UCNJ community. Thirty research projects were on display, including research on tooth decay, preventing Alzheimer's Disease, the role of alkenes in everyday processes, and more. The students were present to showcase their research and answer questions from attendees.

The STEM Division's Research Day had more students present than ever before. More than 100 students presented their research projects on posters and hosted discussions among peers, UCNJ faculty, staff, and esteemed guests. Before the posters were presented, Dr. Alexander Gates from Rutgers University– Newark addressed the crowd of students and discussed the need for research and the career opportunities students can pursue.



Look Out, Sharks – The Owls are Flying in!

Thanks to the generosity of Union County College Foundation donors, the UCNJ Business Pitch Competition returned for its second year! This year, more than 15 UCNJ students submitted business proposals, with five entering the main competition to pitch to the five judges. The judges were: Robert Coopersmith, President of SNIFTY Scented Products; Colleen Shea, Vice President of Sales at Pen Company of America; Ian Brundenell, National Sales Manager for All American Writing Instruments; Victor M. Richel, President & CEO of Richel Family Foundation and Chair of the UCNJ Board of Trustees; and Jim Della Sala, Head of Strategy & Business for Wilmington Trust and UCNJ Board of Governors member. Judging criteria included the pitch's economic potential, clear description and explanation of the business idea, the potential to attract investors, and more.

Tiffany Reynolds with "Milan Skincare" was the first-place victor, earning \$6,000 for her first prize pitch. She developed a skincare line


designed to address a variety of skin issues with high quality, natural ingredients. Second place was earned by Christopher Darcelin for his proposal on "Propeak University, Productivity

Education and Self-Development Program," awarding him \$4,000. Christopher is a passionate advocate for personal development, and his pitch will allow individuals to discover and achieve their life goals. In third place was Daniel Ivanov and Vitaliy Gotsko's "Redezine" pitch, which gave them \$2,000. Using 3D printing, Redezine promises to turn concepts into prototypes in a matter of days, dramatically reducing the cost and time typically associated with traditional prototyping methods.



UCNJ Tennis Spikes the Way for the Future

Following their Women in American History course, UCNJ students Rachel De La Cruz and Cayla Kerekgyarto published their research paper "I just wanted to play tennis" the story on UCNJ tennis player Ellen Magliaro and gender discrimination in college sports before Title IX. The student researchers investigated news accounts, made inquiries with a variety of organizations (NJCAA, National Archives, the federal court system), and conducted several interviews with key figures including Ellen Magliaro, former athletic director and current Dean of STEM William Dunscombe, and named plaintiff in the civil action Michael Johnson. Following its publication, their paper was chosen as the winner of the NJSAA Stellhorn & Waldron Undergraduate Research Project in New Jersey History award. This award recognizes excellence in undergraduate writing about New Jersey history.





No Gray Area in Archive Quest

Students in Dr. Michele Rotunda's History 290 Course explore the UCNJ archives as part of their course research. This year, the archive hunters worked on a variety of projects, including:

- Bibliography of articles in the student newspapers on LGBTQ/AIDS crisis in 1980-90s
- The "Bride Project" researching engagement/wedding announcements of students in the 1950s found in a scrapbook
- · Video on the College's Historic Tree Grove

One of their primary projects included interviewing two UCNJ alumni ('70) Lisa Sherwin and Tom Taylor, who served on the Gray Committee, an organization created to bring black and white students together. The two described themselves as student activists at the College and wrote several articles for the College newspaper.

UCNJ student Frank Ulrich created a finding guide for the materials in the UCNJ archives and has worked on several archive projects, including researching student surveys published in the 1980s and comparing them to student responses today, conducting an oral interview with a UCNJ alumna on gender discrimination in the 1980s, and conducting an oral history with the former editor-in-chief of the College's newspaper, The Scroll. Frank will be presenting his research in a poster session at the New Jersey History and Historic Preservation Conference, held at Princeton University.



UCNJ's Salute to Veterans

At UCNJ, the College strives to provide Veterans, Active-Duty Military, and members of the National Guard or Reserve the best possible support services to help meet their educational goals. To better accommodate these students, the Veteran Lounge opened in September on the College's Cranford Campus. Veterans use the lounge to study in between classes and to connect with their peers, creating a sense of belonging on campus.



Have No Fear, Artificial Intelligence is Here

STEM faculty and staff from the College's Distance Education Department presented two workshops at the C2 STEM Summit. The first workshop, "Designing Sequence Courses and the Importance of Cohorting for STEM Students' Success," was followed by "AI Fight Club." During these presentations, the team shared insights from a decade-long collaboration in redesigning chemistry sequenced courses. They discussed the impact of standardized assessment tools, an independent study project, the creation of an active learning environment, and the implementation of micro-cohorts in the classroom. Furthermore, rather than banning or avoiding artificial intelligence, the presenters advocated for its responsible use, emphasizing its benefits for both faculty and students. -Fun Fact: A draft of this article began with AI!



Plant-astic Business Opportunity at UCNJ

A groundbreaking partnership was formed this year at UCNJ, turning garden plants into a profit! The College's Business Center and STEM division partnered to develop a hydroponic vertical farming system. Under this system, plants grow vertically indoors with synthetic material instead of dirt. With this system in place, plants are able to be harvested every six weeks! In their role, STEM students observe and document the behaviors of the plants and make the necessary adjustments needed to help the plants grow and thrive. On the business side, students are tasked with creating detailed reports and developing a business plan that will enable this project to become a successful farming business. With their success, the hydroponic plant team has been able to distribute vegetables several times throughout the year to students at UCNJ Farmers Markets.



Celebrating the Trinitas School of Nursing Graduates and Faculty

Trinitas School of Nursing, in partnership with UCNJ, provides a Cooperative Nursing Program that awards students with both a diploma in Nursing from Trinitas School of Nursing and an Associate in Science from UCNJ. Two ceremonies were held in January and June, celebrating a combined 131 graduates. The graduation ceremony features a traditional pinning ceremony, which symbolizes a rite of passage into the professional world of nursing and the nurse's commitment to those they care for. The ceremony concluded with the graduates taking their oath as graduate nurses.

This year, three faculty members of Trinitas School of Nursing obtained their Doctor of Nursing Practice degree. Before completing their doctoral program at Farleigh Dickinson University, Dr. Illya DeVera-Bonilla, Dr. Ana Paula Grillo-Dias, and Dr Marie O'Donnell graduated from UCNJ with their Associate in Science degree and their Trinitias School of Nursing Diploma.



This May, the College celebrated 15 new graduates of UCNJ's Respiratory Care Program. Over the course of their program, students learn to administer medical gases and aerosolized drugs, assist physicians with diagnoses, and provide treatment and care to patients with disorders of the heart and lungs. Upon completion, students graduate with an Associate in Applied

Science degree and are eligible to sit for the National Board of Respiratory Care credentialing exams.

The completion ceremony included remarks from UCNJ's Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. Maris Lown, and Interim Dean of the Plainfield Campus and Allied Sciences Dr. Sara Lacagnino. Also in attendance were clinical directors, instructional staff, laboratory staff, and the family and friends of the graduates.








Practical Nursing Program Celebrates Combined 57 Graduates

The Practical Nursing Program at UCNJ equips students with essential skills in patient care, assisting doctors and registered nurses with various medical tasks and treatments. Students are taught to provide compassionate and competent care to patients in various healthcare settings, including hospitals, clinics, and long-term care facilities. Upon graduating, students are eligible to take the NCLEX-PN examination for Practical Nurse licensure.



The College celebrated 57 new graduates over the spring and fall semesters at their pinning ceremony. Dr. Christiana Nwachukwu and Michele Cislo, Associate Professors in Practical Nursing, awarded the pins to the graduates. Following the pinning, the graduates took the Nurses' Pledge and lit candles, led by Donna Sonsiadek, Associate Professor in Practical Nursing. The candles commemorate Florence Nightingale's nighttime aid to wounded soldiers by candlelight.

















This year, the semifinalists all had a GPA of 3.8 and above and were involved with numerous activities on campus. The six semifinalists from UCNJ were Mario Alvarado, of Roselle; Myrvens Sylvester, of Roselle; Nicole Resende Lucena, of Union Township; Sophia Argenziano, of Clark; Precious Opaola, of Linden; Zulemy Gomez-Londono, of Elizabeth.





Students Named Coca-Cola Scholars



Two UCNJ students, Camila Taddeo, of Union Township, and Maryann Ossai, of Hillside, were selected as 2023 Coca-Cola Leaders of Promise Scholars and each received a scholarship. Both students are members of Phi Theta Kappa

Honor Society. Camilla served as Phi Theta Kappa's President and is studying nursing. Maryann is currently pursuing a degree in public administration and was also selected as a 2023 Coca-Cola Military Leaders of Promise Scholar.





At this year's opening ceremony for Black History Month, attendees celebrated with the theme "African Americans and the Arts." Zawadi African Dance and Drum opened the ceremony with a drum and dance performance, inviting the audience to join as well. Student Joshua Kwashie read a poem and student Sarah Towler sang the Black National Anthem, which was followed by remarks from President McMenamin and the elected officials in attendance. The keynote address was issued by Rev. Dr. Wanda Lundy, who serves as Director of the Doctor of Ministry Program at the New York Theology Semiary, board member of the Association for Doctor of Ministry Education. She spoke about the 313+ Project, which honors the more than 313 enslaved and freed African ancestors buried in Elizabeth.

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Hispanic Heritage Month Celebration At UCNJ

UCNJ celebrated the opening of Hispanic Heritage Month with a kickoff celebration, beginning with the singing of the national anthem in Spanish by UCNJ student Adriana Lemus. 
Social Work Services Provides Support to Students on and off Campus





Trustee Jeff Katz Named Senior of Distinction





Lown Family Scholarship

Awarded to full- or part-time students in the Nursing program. Recipients must be entering the final year of their degree program with a minimum of 6 credits. Preference will be given to those students who demonstrate financial need.

Lucky 3 Scholarship

Awarded to a full- or part-time student with a minimum 3.0 GPA and majoring in one of the STEM disciplines.

Suzanne Macaoay Memorial Scholarship funded by the LSRPA Foundation

Awarded to a full- or part-time student for tuition, fees, or books. Student must have a minimum 3.0 GPA at the time of application and be majoring in a field related to environmental protection such as Engineering, Environment Science/Sustainability, Biology or Chemistry. Preference will be given to those students who demonstrate financial need.

Margolies Family Transfer Scholarship

To provide last-dollar financial assistance after non-loan financial aid is incorporated to high-achieving, graduating transfer students to a selective college of their choice and obtain their Bachelor's degree. Awarded to two full-time students with a minimum 3.75 GPA by the beginning of their final semester at UCNJ. Students must complete the Margolies Family Transfer Scholarship Application, and students selected to receive this scholarship will be made by the Margolies Family Transfer Scholarship committee. Students must complete either the FAFSA form or the NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application. Specific requirements must be met in order for the students to receive a continuation of the second-year scholarship award.

Isha & Shree Mehrotra Women's Scholarship

Awarded to a full- or part-time student for tuition, fees, or books. Preference will be given to female or non-binary students who demonstrate financial need.

Neafsey Family Part-Time Scholarship

Awarded to part-time students with a minimum 3.0 GPA, who have completed 30 credits. Recipients must currently be working while attending Union College of Union County, NJ (UCNJ).

Orchard Family Scholarship

Awarded to a full-time student with a minimum 3.0 GPA. Recipient must be a graduate of Abraham Clark High School in Roselle, NJ. Preference will be given to those students who demonstrate financial need.

Mary D. & Lawrence T. Quirk, Jr. Memorial Scholarships I & II

Awarded to full- or part-time students who have graduated from either Plainfield High School or the Plainfield Academy for the Arts & Advanced Studies (PAAAS). Preference will be given to undocumented students, i.e. students who do not have an official legal status in the United States. Preference will be given to those students who demonstrate financial need.

Mary D. & Lawrence T. Quirk, Jr. Memorial Scholarships III & IV

Awarded to full- or part-time UCNJ students who are enrolled in the ASL & Deaf Studies degree program to obtain an Associate's degree in Deaf Studies. Recipients must have successfully completed a minimum of one ASL course at UCNJ or any other accredited institution. Preference will be given to undocumented students, i.e. students who do not have an official legal status in the United States. Preference will be given to those students who demonstrate financial need.

Olga Ritter Endowed Scholarship for Survivors & Heroes

Awarded to a full- or part-time student for tuition, fees, or books. Students must have a minimum 2.5 GPA at the time of application. Student must either be an immigrant to the U.S. who has overcome significant obstacles and challenges, or an individual who has stepped up and provided significant aid to an immigrant in need. Student must complete either the FAFSA form or the NJ Alternative Financial Aid Application.

RSI Foundation Nursing Scholarship

Awarded to students enrolled in the Nursing program. Preference will be given to Rahway residents; if none, then the scholarship will be offered to Union County residents.






BUDGETED REVENUE BY SOURCE

For Year End June 30, 2024




- State Appropriations 15.3%




UCNJ Launches Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) Program

This 620-hour program included comprehensive training through 14 modules—12 didactic courses, a clinical internship, and a certification review course. The curriculum, including course syllabi, daily lesson plans, and materials, was developed or refined to meet current industry standards.

All 15 participants of the first cohort completed the program, with three students earning their EKG (CET) and Phlebotomy (CPT) certifications. They all also achieved their Certified Clinical Medical Assistant Certification (CCMA) credential from the National Healthcareer Association (NHA) and Basic Life Support (BLS) certification from the American Heart Association (AHA).

Impressively, all completers from this cohort are currently employed. Employer partners include RWJB Health, Atlantic Health Systems, Hackensack Meridian Health, Saint Peter's Healthcare System, Village MD, and Union County Healthcare Associates/MD Urgent Care Center.



- 2013: The College revamps its mission statement to "Transforming Our Community... One Student at a Time," to accurately reflect the nature of the environment at the three campuses.
- **2015:** The new Health Sciences Building, the former Thul Auto Parts Building, opens at the Plainfield Campus on Oct. 20.
- 2016: After two years of construction, the Helen E. Chaney Student Services Center opens in the new two-story Student Development Building at the Cranford Campus. This project was made possible thanks to the support of the Union County Board of County Commissioners and the Union County Improvement Authority.
- **2016:** The Annex at the Plainfield Campus reopens after damages caused by a 2012 fire and includes a new information commons, cafeteria, bookstore, and faculty offices.
- **2017:** The Middle States Commission on Higher Education reaffirms the College's accreditation.
- **2018:** A major renovation of the lower level and first floor of the Lessner Building at the Elizabeth Campus is completed.
- 2018: An Innovation Center is established at the Cranford Campus to provide students with the opportunity to learn current technologies such as coding, virtual reality, and using 3D printers.
- 2018: The College publishes its first Undergraduate
 Research Journal and builds a Student Research
 Lab to provide dedicated space for ongoing research projects.

- **2019:** UCNJ establishes a respiratory care program at the Plainfield Campus.
- 2019: The College is named a Top 150 U.S. Community College by The Aspen Institute for the first time and is eligible to compete for the 2021 \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence.
- 2019: Major renovations to the Health Sciences Building in Plainfield are completed.
- 2020: COVID-19 hits the U.S. and forces the College, and all educational institutions in New Jersey, to move operations and instruction remote during the Spring 2020 semester. Operations return to campus in July. Fall classes are offered remote live, online, and face-to-face.
- 2020: Dr. McMenamin is named the Marie Y. Martin Community College CEO of the Year by the Association of Community College Trustees.
- **2021:** A major renovation of the Roy W. Smith Theater is completed.
- 2021: Weidenburner Hall is dedicated in honor of a \$2.7 million donation by alumnus Bruce
 Weidenburner, which is the largest single donation in Union County College
 Foundation history.



- 2022: The College's Scotch Plains
 Campus is re-opened as a
 destination campus and
 re-imagined as a University
 Center and home to the
 College's virtual campus.
- 2022: The College is named as one of 25 semifinalists for the 2023 \$1 million Aspen Prize. UCNJ is the only college in New Jersey to be named as a semifinalist.
- 2023: For the first time, two
 UCNJ students are selected
 for the Jack Kent Cooke
 Foundation Undergraduate
 Transfer Scholarship. UCNJ
 now has had six graduates
 who have received this
 prestigious award.
- 2023: UCNJ is the first community college in New Jersey to film an episode of "The College Tour," a streaming program on Amazon Prime, Apple TV, and more which features the stories of 10 UCNJ students.

- 2023: The College celebrates its 90th anniversary in October with the dedication of a gazebo and a prohibitionera themed party on the lawn outside of the Victor M. Richel Commons.
- 2024: In June, the College is named as one of 10 finalists for the 2025 \$1 million Aspen Prize. This is the first time the College has been recognized as a finalist. UCNJ is the only college in New Jersey to be named as a finalist.
- 2024: On June 1, the College becomes UCNJ Union College of Union County, NJ.



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
